And refuse to give small acts of
kindness.

Surah Al-Ma'oun was revealed in Makkah. It was directed toward people who did not help others, especially the weak, poor, or orphans. One reason for its revelation was to criticize the wealthy leaders of Quraysh, like Abu Sufyan, who used to slaughter two camels every day. Still, when a poor orphan child asked him for help, he hit him with a stick and refused to help him while pretending to be good. This Surah teaches that true belief is shown through kind actions, not just words.

VERSE-BY-VERSE EXPLANATION

1: "Have you seen the one who denies the religion?"

This verse begins with a question to make us think. It talks about people who don't believe in Allah's religion or the Day of Judgment. Such people don't care about what is right or wrong because they think they won't be judged for their actions. Their hearts are hard, and they lack kindness and mercy toward others.

2-3: "That is the one who repels the orphan and does not encourage the feeding of the poor."

An orphan is a child who has lost one or both parents. Allah commands us to be kind and caring toward orphans because they are often vulnerable and in need of help. But this Surah describes people who push orphans away instead of helping them. These people not only fail to help the needy themselves, but they also discourage others from helping. They have no sense of responsibility for the poor in their community, which shows their selfishness.

Being good to orphans and feeding the poor are major acts of worship in Islam. They show our gratitude to Allah for the blessings He has given us. Ignoring or mistreating orphans and the poor is a sign of a heart that lacks faith and compassion.

4-5: "So woe to those who pray, but are heedless of their prayer."

These verses warn people who pray only as a formality or to look good in front of others. They might pray on time, but their hearts are not focused on Allah. They are distracted and don't care about the meaning of their prayers. Such prayers don't bring them closer to Allah because they are insincere.

Prayer (Salah) is one of the pillars of Islam. It connects us to Allah and reminds us to be thankful and obedient. However, when someone prays carelessly, it shows that their faith is weak. Prayer should come from the heart and inspire us to do good deeds.

6: "Those who show off."

This verse talks about people who do good deeds just to show off to others, not because they want to please Allah. For example, they might give charity or pray so that others will praise them and think they are good people. This kind of behavior is called *Riyaa* (showing off), and it is a form of hypocrisy. Allah knows what is in our hearts, so our actions must always be sincere.

7: "And refuse to give small acts of kindness."

This verse mentions people who are so selfish that they won't even share small things with others, like water, food, or tools. In Islam, even the smallest act of kindness, like a smile or helping someone carry their groceries, is a good deed. These selfish people not only refuse to give, but they also don't care about building a caring and supportive community.

This verse teaches us that every good deed, no matter how small, is important. Refusing to help others shows a lack of faith and gratitude for Allah's blessings.

THE THEME OF THE SURAH

1. The main theme of the surah is the importance of kindness and helping the people in need.
2. The importance of sincerity and not to show off.

KEY LESSONS FROM THE SURAH

1. **True Faith Is Shown by Actions:** Believing in Allah means helping others, especially orphans and the poor. Kindness and sharing are signs of good character.
2. **Sincerity in Worship:** We should pray to please Allah, not to impress people. Our connection to Allah should come from our hearts.
3. **Small Acts Matter:** Even little acts of kindness, like helping someone in need or sharing what we have, are important in Islam.
4. **Caring for Orphans and the Poor:** Helping those in need is one of the most important values in Islam. It pleases Allah and makes us better people.
5. **Avoid Showing Off:** Pretending to be good for praise or attention is wrong. Allah sees what is in our hearts.
